The Great I AM: The Good Shepherd (4/19/2020)

Who was the most famous shepherd of the Old Testament? None other than King David. As a shepherd, when a lion or a bear came and carried off one of the sheep from the flock, he went after it, struck it, and rescued the sheep from its mouth. When it turned on him, he seized it by its hair, struck it and killed it. At a young age he was already brave and courageous—strong in the LORD. When he was still a teenager, the prophet Samuel was sent to David's house to anoint him as Israel's next king. At that time kings considered themselves shepherds of their country. Just as he protected his flock, King David would protect his people from their enemies all around. He was a valiant warrior and brave leader.

He was also a talented author and musician. He wrote one of the most famous, if not the most famous, psalm of them all—Psalm 23. "The LORD is my shepherd I shall lack nothing." Not only was he a shepherd, not only did he write about how the LORD is his shepherd, but he was also the forefather of another King—our King of kings and Lord of lords, Jesus Christ.
