Last Week's Offerings

The Lutheran Reformation

Martin Luther posted the 95 Theses on October 31, 1517. Disturbed by the claims made for indulgences (the Roman Catholic Church's grants, for a price, of release from temporal punishment due for sins), Luther wanted to debate the issue of indulgences publicly. The 95 Theses were intended to be discussion points for that debate. The theses were written in Latin because the debate was intended for a learned audience; soon however they were translated into German and quickly spread across Germany.

Although the posting of the 95 Theses is generally considered to be the beginning of the Reformation, these theses are an early work of Luther and do not fully reflect his later positions on other theological issues. The following are some key theses in the 95 Theses:

1. When our Lord and Master Jesus Christ said, "Repent" [Matt. 4:17], he willed the entire life of believers to be one of repentance.

- 36. Any truly repentant Christian has a right to full remission of penalty and guilt, even without indulgence letters.
- 62. The true treasure of the church is the most holy gospel of the glory and grace of God.

Luther Dates

- 1483 Born at Eisleben, Germany, November 10
- 1517 On October 31, posts 95 Theses on Castle Church
- 1518 In October, appears before Cardinal Cajetan at Augsburg, but refuses to take back his teaching
- 1521 At Diet of Worms in April, on trial before Emperor Charles V and other leaders of church and state, he refuses to recant writings; after the Diet of Worms, he is "kidnapped" by Frederick the Wise, and hidden at Wartburg Castle
- 1527 Writes "A Mighty Fortress is our God"
- 1529 Publishes Large Catechism and Small Catechism
- 1530 Luther, as outlaw cannot attend Diet of Augsburg; The Augsburg Confession, one of our Lutheran confessions is presented as a defense of Lutheran, Biblical teaching
- 1534 Publishes complete German Bible
- 1537 Writes Smalcald Articles, another of our Lutheran confessions
- 1546 Dies in Eisleben, February 18

Three Solas

The three "Solas" (Latin for alone), sum up Lutheran Theology:

- *Sola Gratia* "By Grace Alone" We are saved by God's grace alone. That is, only through God's undeserved love are we declared innocent. It is not through any achievement of our own.
- *Sola Fide* "By Faith Alone" Only faith in God's promise that he has declared us not guiltyis what makes God's objective declaration our own. This faith is worked in us by the Holy Spirit, as we declare in the explanation to the Third Article, "I believe that I cannot by my own thinking or choosing believe in Jesus...".
- *Sola Scriptura* "By Scripture Alone" The truths of God's grace to us in Jesus, is revealed to us in His Word. God's Word is our source for our doctrine and our life.

The Lutheran Church Today

"There is a historic saying in Lutheranism that the Church stands or falls on the article of justification. To *justify* means "to declare righteous". God's sure and certain declaration that we are righteous in his eyes is possible only because of our Savior, Jesus Christ. . . On Him, and Him alone, we stand forgiven" (Concordia – The Lutheran Confessions, p. 58-59, CPH 2005)

Article IV of the Augsburg Confession says, "Furthermore, it is taught that we cannot obtain forgiveness of sin and righteousness before God through our merit, work, or satisfactions, but that we receive forgiveness of sin and become righteous before God out of grace for Christ's sake through faith when we believe that Christ has suffered for us and that for his sake our sin is forgiven and righteousness and eternal life are given to us. For God will regard and reckon this faith as righteousness in his sight, as St. Paul says in Romans 3 and 4."

Luther's Explanation to the 2nd Article of the Apostles Creed

We will recite this as our confession of faith in worship.

I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended into hell. The third day he rose again from the dead. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of God the Father almighty. From there he will come to judge the living and the dead.

What does this mean?

I believe that Jesus Christ, true God, begotten of the Father from eternity, and also true man, born of the virgin Mary, is my Lord. He has redeemed me, a lost and condemned creature, purchased and won me from all sins, from death and from the power of the devil, not with gold or silver, but with his holy, precious blood and with his innocent suffering and death. All this he did that I should be his own, and live under him in his kingdom, and serve him in everlasting righteousness, innocence and blessedness, just as he has risen from death and lives and rules eternally. This is most certainly true.
